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Swimming Provision –

Within the current year 6 cohort, which we provided swimming provision for in year 3 and 4, 97% swim a distance of 25m or more in one stroke. While all also being able to produce self rescue and buoyance skills in a wide variety of ways.

94% of pupils (32 out of 34) within the class can do this for two or more strokes for a distance of 25m or more.

35% of the pupils (12 out of 34) currently swim outside school for a club.

Within the class 55% (19 out of 34) would be classed as high achieving swimmers – being able to swim 3 or more strokes over a distance of 6 lengths and producing a variety of turns.

How is it sustainable?

There are many sustainable elements to the money spent from our PE premium money this year.

The most money has been spent on forest school training and set up costs, this has meant the school has a fully resourced area and fully trained set of staff to produce high quality sessions. The staffing cost within this is minimal and will remain at a constant level for the foreseeable future.

The money spent on staffing this year has made a big difference and the coaching member of staff we have for lunchtimes has engaged more children in more active activities at lunchtimes and this link with outside clubs and the interest in athletics, basketball and cricket.

Future plans

We want to continue to grow our provision and will continue to look at the number of sports and equipment we have to provide opportunities in different activities. We are looking at future proofing our investments, using it to build infrastructure to keep and support the past and present investments.
